
hat a year it has been for Rotary.

- 2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
- 3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
- 4. Will it be **BENEFICIAL** to all concerned?


District Governor's My Last Project






Report of Proceedings 31st District Conference 2022

DG's Visit to The Rotary Club Suntec City, Singapore

On 20 June 2022, DG Dolly Yeap visited the Rotary Club of Suntec City at the NUSS Suntec City Guild House. AG Adrian Jefferson accompanied her on the visit.

President Janice Goh delivered the Club Report highlighting the achievements made for the year. With a Club membership base of 35, we took a strategic stance in fulfilling Rotary's areas of focus whilst providing volunteering and leadership opportunities. Notably we achieved a record of 12 community projects covering disaster response, improving literacy, developing youth, empowering women, celebrating healthcare workers and distributing groceries to the needy. These projects spanned District 3310, across to other Districts in Malaysia, Myanmar and South Africa.

Our sponsored Rotaract Club of North West led by President Kush Madia was present and he spoke of his Club's projects benefiting the needy and foreign workers. Sustainability was a main feature of their projects.

DG Dolly shared her experience as District Governor in leading the District for the year. She shared a video clip of the preparations she and her team made to climb Mount Kinabalu. Her actual climb was arduous and we felt the intensity of emotions besides physical fatigue.

DG Dolly had a remarkable year topped by the climb up Mount Kinabalu to raise a target of US\$100,000 for the End Polio campaign. We are all inspired by her zeal and courage to lead. True to this Rotary year's theme, DG Dolly has Served to Change Lives.

District 3310 COVID-19 Response Task Force

On August 26, 2021, DG Dolly Yeap appointed PP Ng Yaw Hua to set up a Task Force to raise funds and to coordinate and leverage District 3310 Rotary and Rotaract Clubs' efforts to assist their respective communities in the face of continuing widespread adverse humanitarian effects of the Covid-19 Pandemic. Guidelines and SOP were speedily established with the aim of encouraging D3310 Rotary & Rotaract clubs to undertake projects with these funds through ease of application, speedy approval and disbursement of grant funds.

In PHASE 1, each Club was entitled to apply for a maximum of RM5,000 grant with 60% matching from Clubs' own funds to complement their intended Covid-19 projects; subject to a set of terms and conditions. Grant applications must be received by November 30, 2021 and projects must be completed within 2 months of receipt of grant funds. Total grants of RM133,200 were disbursed under 1st phase

To encourage clubs to further undertake COVID-19 response projects, PHASE 2 was initiated on January 5, 2022. The club's mandatory fund matching was reduced from 60% to 20% of grant amount while all other terms and conditions remain the same. RM105,000 grants funds were disbursed under 2nd phase.

The remaining balance of RM90,400 in our Grants Fund was offered from May 1, 2022 under PHASE 3 by increasing grant per project to RM8,000 with a 25% club funds matching. The Program was closed on May 28, 2022 when all grant funds were disbursed.







Datuk Zainie Abdul Aucasa is a Malaysian of Sabah origin, from the Rotary Club of Kota Kinabalu. He is an accountant by profession. A FELLOW member of the Chartered Association of Certified Accountants, United kingdom. After serving several years in various key positions in both the government and corporate sectors, Datuk Zainie decided to opt for early retirement in 2011, with 4 years of his contract remaining, to take a Rotary position of a District Governor in the Rotary year 2011/2012.

Since then he has been very much involved in voluntary organizations especially in Rotary and in areas of environmental conservation. He has been President the of the Sabah Conservation Society for several years now, (partly instrumental in getting it a RAMSAR recognition), a founding trustee of the Sabah Environmental Trust, and the chairman of the **BIMP-EAGA** Malaysian business Council, environmental CLUSTER, a regional inter country grouping between Brunei Darussalam, Indonesia, Malaysia and the Philippines.

At our event, Datuk Zainie gave a talk on "Climate Solution Through Wetlands Approach". His talk touched upon various aspects related to the 17 Sustainable Development Goals, the Paris Agreement and more importantly, the Ramsar Convention. He also mentioned the Ramsar sites in Malaysia and the various objectives of the Sabah Wetlands Conservation Society.

It was an insightful talk as it opened up several opportunities for clubs in Singapore to gather information and implement in the mangrove stretches in Singapore.

Our **Keynote Speaker, Ms. Radhika Bhargava**, is a National Geographic Explorer and a final year Ph.D. Candidate at the National University of Singapore's Geography Department. She specializes in the management of large-scale coastal threats. She got a double bachelors degree in Biology and Environmental Studies from the University of Cincinnati in Cincinnati, Ohio with the highest honor, her education being covered under the UC Global Scholarship.

She worked at the Center for Research in Endangered Species and Wildlife in the Cincinnati Zoo, and she conducted field research in Paris, Amazon Rainforest, and on coral reefs of the Caribbean Islands. She pursued her Masters in Environmental Management at the University of San Francisco where she was an American Association of University Women Fellow. For her master's thesis, she worked in collaboration with NASA, USAID, and Google to develop a geospatial capacity building platform to support forest conservation in the Mekong countries, for which she received Academic Excellence and Research Award.

Currently, she is working in collaboration with the National Geographic Society on understanding and modeling the process of erosion in several mangrove forests in the world.

Radhika spoke about the importance of one of the key ecosystems to climate change protection- the mangroves. Her topic was "Mangrove Restoration and Preservation" She mentioned how mangroves are a key resource in Singapore, in Sundarbans where almost 14 million people directly depend on them, and for the whole world. She shared some stories from her fieldwork to highlight how mangroves play a key role in the protection of low-lying islands like Singapore. Finally, she shared some ways in which we all can contribute to mangrove conservation and restoration in Singapore and globally.

2. A Planet-friendly Menu option

We had provided the guests an option of choosing a 100% Planet-friendly Plant based meal option. Out of 116 registrations, 106 guests had chosen the plant based meal option, something that is truly unprecedented on so many levels.

We worked very closely with the event management and Executive Chef of Hotel Grand Hyatt to curate a menu that was delicious, healthy and sustainable so that an event dedicated to the environment walked the talk, specially when it came to the food. Agriculture being one of the main drivers for Climate Change, and with multiple urges from the UN and other climate organizations for the affluent societies to move to a diet that is prominent on plants and less in animal products it was important that we led by example. A menu that was planet-friendly and delicious was presented to the guests so that they could explore the idea of lessening their dependence on animal products in their diet, which has been hailed as the "most powerful climate solution" by numerous climate organizations around the world.



During her talk, Rtn Ambaree, who is also the Organizing Chairperson of the event as well as the Co-Chair of the Plant-Rich Diet Task force under ESRAG, she explained how by choosing the plant based menu, we managed to already save more than 60% of carbon emissions as compared to other menus.



3. Fundraising for Garden City Funds by NPARKS

Honorable Chairman, Prof. Leo Tan, of Garden City Fund, which is a charitable organization established by NPARKS was present to receive a cheque of SGD 10,100 which was raised during the course of registrations. These funds were a contribution to Singapore Government's #OneMillionTrees campaign so that more trees can be planted. Prof. Tan also gave a short talk about the various Garden City Funds projects and ways in which Rotary Clubs can get involved with them.

Baking for a Cause Rotary Club of Puteri Lagoon & Rotary Club of Johor Straits View

JOHOR BARU: The Rotary Club of Puteri Lagoon (RCPL) and the Rotary Club of Johor Straits View (RCJSV) are collaborating to empower single mothers to be trained in entrepreneurial skills, enabling them to be self-sustainable.

The project themed "Baking for a Cause" is to provide technical skills in baking so that they can be employed or be self-employed as bakers. RCPL president Yee Woon Seng said initially 12 single mothers were selected to undergo this programme to be trained to adapt new skills and be independent. "We want them to cultivate their self-confidence and take part in society as responsible individuals," he said. He said many single mothers have been hit badly during the Covid-19 pandemic, either losing their jobs or can't work because they need to take care of their kids.

"Single mothers are in their predicament mostly because of spousal death, spousal abandonment or divorce. Many face financial challenges and most single mothers that hail from rural areas usually lack specialised job skills, as well as the education required to get proper employment," he said. Yee stressed that Persatuan Kebajikan Wanita Penyayang Johor Baru, RCPL and RCJSV conducted the assessment to ensure the eligibility of the single mothers to take part in this programme. "Financial independence is what single mothers are struggling to achieve. These women have virtually no savings or very minimal savings of their own," he explained.

Elaborating further, he said they were fully dependent on their husbands for finances. When they become single mothers, a heavy burden is placed upon their shoulders to fight for survival. "They build a foundation of business skills through the programme and become economically independent for their families after graduating," he said. He explained that these single mothers would be provided with raw materials, tools necessary and an oven which they can loan from the Club.

He said if these single mums can provide reports they bake daily or weekly for six months, then they can own the oven. The aim of this project, he said, is to allow these single mums to stand on their own feet and venture into small home-based businesses to make ends meet. He lamented the fact that many single mums are jobless and with our training, they can then embark into the business world and need not be dependent on others.

"Many of them are in dire straits and we show them how to make more money from their own home so that they can save and pay off their debts and educate their children," he stated. He said once they pick up the skill and knowledge they can be employed in a bakery or pastry shop or even do online business by selling cakes or products for a living. Yee who launched the programme hoped they could rope in more single mothers and provide the training so that they can lead a life of independence.

RCPL and RCJSV are extending their hands to help these mothers to earn money and to control their own lives both within and outside the home. Present at the cake baking session were Permas assemblyman Baharudin Mohd Taib, RCPL president Yee Woon Seng, RCJSV president Catherine Chai and other Rotarian officials.

Signature Project-BRING A SMILE (a Cleft Lip & Palate Repair Project) Rotary Club of Tawau Tanjung

In 2012, Rotary Club of Tawau Tanjung started organizing the 'SMILE' project as our club's signature project. In our local community (Tawau) there are numerous Cleft Lip and/or Palate cases. Due to the shortage of plastic surgeons at local Tawau hospital, we need to depend on visiting specialists from KK, QE Hospital. And we also understand the limited number of specialists also running in very tight schedules. This accumulated a long waiting list of patients. Financial difficulties also another major issue especially for those children born undocumented. As mentioned above, timing is the crucial part for the patients. Once the patient grows the result and effect of the corrective surgery will be lower. As a Service Organization, Rotary Club of Tawau Tanjung felt honored to take up this opportunity to organize and finance patients' operation expenses.

Cleft Lip and/or palate is the most common facial birth defect, affecting one in 700 babies worldwide, in Malaysia the ratio might even be higher. Cleft Lip and palate defects not only the outlook of a baby but can interfere with eating, speaking, and breathing and can cause dental problems, ear infections, and hearing loss as well. A cleft lip or palate can be successfully treated with surgery, especially so if conducted soon after birth or in early childhood. The ideal age to receive corrective surgery is between 10 and 12 weeks for cleft lip and between 9 and 18 months for cleft palate.

According to some medical statistics, the life of a cleft child is miserably. And children with unrepaired clefts have an average life expectancy 15 years shorter than other children, mainly due to feeding difficulties in early childhood and other factors.

Most children who have their clefts repaired early enough are able to have a happy youth and social life. Having a cleft palate/lip does not inevitably lead to a psycho-social problem. They grow up uneducated, and they are secluded and don't have any friends. These all mainly because they look different and speech abnormally.

We worked together with Tawau local hospital and supported funds from our Taiwan sister club, over the years, we had sponsored more than 30 patients. To continue benefiting local communities in 2020, we submitted our 'Bring a Smile' Global Grant Project application that has been approved. Now, patients from Hospital Kunak, Hospital Semporna and Hospital Lahad Datu also benefited from this project.

One of our most recent special case is a combination cleft palate and Pierre Robin Syndrome, 11months old patient, Mohammad Alfiendo Bin Abdullah. Due to his parents are non-malaysian citizens and are from a low income group, they're not affordable to pay the amount of RM17,000.00 surgical fee and equipment for the following operation. With PDG Datuk Hj. Zainie's assistance and approval from District Governor Dolly Yeap, the patient's surgical operation been approved by hospital Lahad Datu. And now surgical specialist, Dr Ruben, scheduled the operation in mid of April as soon as the ordered equipment arrived.





Rotary Club in Collaboration With Lahad Datu Hospital Holds Cataract Carnival at Lahad Datu on The 10th - 12th June 2022

The Rotary Club of Sandakan North in collaboration with Lahad Datu Hospital is organising a Cataract Carnival from 10 to 12 June 2022.

This Cataract Carnival provides surgery for 50 deserving Cataract patients is part of the continuous wider effort by the Rotary Cubs in Sabah under the Global Grant 2122413 Gift of Sight Sabah 2.0, worth about US\$90,000 or approximately RM360,000 to compliment the Government's initiatives to eliminate avoidable blindness for people in Sabah especially those rural poor and needy communities.

The Club President Alan Khoo said the project was timely as Sabah had the most alarming magnitude of eye problems in the country. The Malaysia National Eye survey in 1996 indicated that Sabah, highest prevalence of visual impairment and the highest prevalence of blindness which is equivalent to more than two and half time the National overall figure. Sabah also recorded the highest prevalence of refractive error which was almost three times the National level. The survey also showed that the State is the second highest in prevalence of low vision and untreated Cataract and was the third highest in prevalence of Cataract.



He said the project was made possible in part by a grant from the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International, generous support and contribution from Rotary International District 3462 in Taichung Taiwan through Rotary Club of Changhwa Evergreen (international partner), our own District 3310 through District Designated Fund (DDF), Kota Kinabalu Rotary Institute (KKRI) and Rotarians' contribution from 10 Rotary Clubs in Sabah (Rotary Clubs Kota Kinabalu, Likas Bay, Tanjang Aru, Luyang, Kinabalu Sutera, Kota Kinabalu Pearl, Kota Kinabalu Mandarin, Tawau, Sandakan and Sandakan North (for being the lead club for this huge Global Grant Gift of Sight Sabah 2.0 project).

The Global Grant Gift of Sight Sabah 2.0 Cataract project is being implemented in collaboration with the Eye Department of Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Duchess of Kent Hospital Sandakan, Tawau, Lahad Datu Hospital, KPJ Specialist Hospital Kota Kinabalu, EyeMedics Specialist Eye Centre in Kota Kinabalu and Malaysia Medical Association Sabah branch. The partnering government hospitals and private hospital/eye specialist centre are providing free surgeries while the Rotary Global Grant funding of US\$90,000 is to provide IOL for about 800 – 1,000 deserving cataract patients. This is another success of many Rotary Clubs' programmes utilizing the power of "Partnership In-Service" representing another outstanding example of a public and Non-Governmental Organisation and Rotary partnership where resources are shared to undertake bigger project.



According to Past District Governor Philip Chong, who is the Coordinator for this Global Grant Gift of Sight Sabah 2.0 project, that disease prevention and treatment like avoidable blindness is one of the SEVEN Area of Focus of the Rotary Foundation's humanitarian service program that has been benefiting the local and globe communities over the 117 years of existence of Rotary International.

In addition, Rotary Clubs in Sabah has been actively carried out many prevention of blindness projects over the past 20 years. The most recent Cataract project was the Global Grant Gift of Sight Sabah 1.0 in 2017-2018 where 1,009 Cataract patients has benefited and regained their eyesight. With the relaxation of Govt.'s SOP and opening after the COVID 19 pandemic, Rotarians hope to mobilise trained Cataract Finders to assist in screening cataract patients especially those in rural villagers all over in Sabah for the current Global Grant project.



He also said that Rotarians are People of Action and share a unique passion for taking action to improve their communities and the world which is in line with the Rotary Vision statement "Together, we see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change — across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves."

"A successful Socio-Medical Outreach with plenty of fellowship with Rotarians and friends of RCKKS"

It has been over 2 years since our Club did a Socio-Medical Outreach program and it was due to the Covid-19 pandemic. As such, it is fitting for our Club, through the organisation of Past President Datuk Dr Ganesh, to restart this signature programme of our Club to Pensiangan.

The trip to Pensiangan from Sapulut alone (Keningau to Sapulut took approximately 1.5 hour) took almost 3 hours to reach in, bearing in mind this is a gravel and muddy road. Even google map could not show us the path to the destination! There were 9 vehicles with 30 members, families and friends of our Club as well as volunteering medical assistants, pharmarcist and dental assistants from Keningau Hospital, whok joined for this meaningful program of our Club.

After a challenging journey in, we finally reached Pensiangan and proceeded with our Socio-Medical Outreach programme. We provided the village folks with medical, dental and eye checkups, deworming pills for the children, face masks, some food packs, clothings, toys and bags that our Club brought in. The impression that we got from the village here is that while it is clear they just basically live there, but it is hard to imagine how they would have to travel through those challenging road to go out to get their necessities.

After all the hardwork, everyone had a fine evening of dinner and fellowship. The next day, we departed to Keningau at 8.00am after breakfast. We had lunch at Keningau before we all went back to KK.It was indeed a worthwhile programme to Pensiangan! Even though we had cars that broke down in and out of Pensiangan we did our small part to serve to change lives of community therein.

Thank you so much to all Rotarians of our Club, their families and friends, as well as the volunteering medical assistants, pharmacist, doctors and dental assistant. Also thank you to Andre, the Medical Assistant at Klinik Kesihatan Pensiangan for arranging this programme, our food and lodging for the night there.











Club project Special feature - Tamparuli Girls' Hostel

The Kg. Bantayan Girls' Hostel in Tamparuli is part of two of the ambitious and significant long-term projects which RCKKS had embarked on and successfully completed. Both the hostels were built with the objectives of providing the poor and under-privileged students from the remote surrounding villages with comfortable shelter and easier access to schools for education.

A bit of the background on the other hostel, St. Maria Gloretti Girls' Hostel (SMGH) in Keningau. It was completed in 2000 and it had made huge difference to the lives of many rural students in Keningau since its inception, with many having subsequently graduated from colleges and/or universities and are now gainfully employed professionals. Many are now living out of poverty and enjoying a more dignified life. SMGH can accommodate up to 100 students and is currently managed by the Franciscan Sisters from the Catholic Diocese.

The Kg. Bantayan Girls' Hostel in Tamparuli (which is a joint project with H.E.L.P. Foundation) on the other hand has recently completed this year with funds raised throughout the years from one charity dinner to another, one charity golf to another, various donations from the members and Rotarians, good Samaritans and corporate donors towards the main purpose, that is, to have a hostel to accommodate girls students from rural area around Tamparuli, so to enable them to have access to education in nearby schools, which they would otherwise be deprived of due to the remote locations of their homes.

The land to this hostel was donated by a Mr Tan Chong Yian to the H.E.L.P. Foundation for the purpose of building a hostel thereon, whereby RCKKS had entered into a JV with H.E.L.P. Foundation to take up the role and task to construct, and complete the hostel. The hostel is capable to accommodate up to 200 students once it is fully operational.



27th Aug 21





MENTAL LIT - PROJECT ACCENDO II:

1st Dec to 3rd Dec 21

The Youth Service Committee and Interact Coordinating Committee (ICC) launched a joint project – the Mental Lit Project Accendo II – for Youth Corp of Singapore. VP Ronald supported Accendo's project to make the IMH virtual.



The Ministry of Education has been focusing increasingly on mental health over the past few years, even though it is a common phenomenon among Singaporeans. The Mentally LIT workshop, organized by the Institute of Mental Health (IMH) and REACH organization, aimed to educate youths on mental health issues. This virtual program took place from 1st to 3rd of December in which over 30 Interactors from 12 different schools participated. Interactors participated in meaningful focused group discussions and thought-provoking presentations throughout the programme, which were complemented by extensive pre-reading web links and worksheets provided by IMH. Interactors learned a great deal from the workshop, including types of mental illnesses, the importance of building a strong and close-knit support system, and ways to improve mental health stigmas.

The program provided Interactors with an opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of the subject, and they shared this information with their family and friends. According to some Interactors, the workshop prompted meaningful conversations and addressed common misconceptions about mental illness. Interactors were also pleased with the depth of information imparted to them throughout the workshop, as the slides and pre-reading resources were beneficial in gaining a grasp of the subject matter. In anticipation of embarking on a journey of encouraging positive mental health among all individuals while removing a stigma perpetuated by people's preconceived notions, IMH hopes that the workshop has adequately addressed the concerns and queries of workshop participants.

SINGAPORE YOUTH MEDICAL FORUM

10th & 13th Dec 21



The Youth Service partnered with Singapore Youth Medical Forum 2021. SYMF contributes to the healthcare sector by organizing webinars, social media engagements, volunteer opportunities, and their year-end symposium on "Moving Beyond COVID-19." by partnering with NUS Saw Swee Hock School of Public Health, Ang Mo Kio Thye Hua Kwan Community Hospital, Outram Community Hospital, and St Luke's Hospital.

The SYMF Year-End Symposium was attended by over 300 students from 41



It encourages creativity in studying methods deeper and promotes understanding of contents, the particularly during Zoom sessions where there are more restrictions and distractions thus lowering motivation of students to study. The purpose of the program is to bring joy and develop international friendships with the orphans by organizing games and activities based on the Christmas season enhancing

professional development and health awareness through workshops and presentations.

ASIA CLEAN HANDS PROJECT

SE Report

GANGTOK, December 22: The Rotary Club of Gangtok Smart City organised 'Asia Clean Project' programme at Deorali Girls Senior Secondary School on December 18-21 here. The programme was organised in collaboration with Rotary Club of Singapore, informs a press release.

A total of 100 students of NSS club of the school participated in the programme. The proposed programme was to educate the girls on proper hand washing techniques, soap making procedures, reusable masks and Covid-19 guidelines.

The educational session was conducted virtually by Hwa Chong Institution, Singapore. Vocational chairman of Rotary Club of Gangtok Sangay Choden thanked Jimmy, Mukund and Uttam of Rotary Club of Singapore for sponsoring the project, the release mentions.

This program was attended by 100 girls from the NSS Club at the school. They were trained on proper hand washing techniques, soap making, reusable masks, and guidelines for following covid 19. Educational sessions were conducted by Hwa Chong Institution Interactors.

There were 8 lessons in the program, each lasting 2:30 to 3 hours and divided into two parts, one theory and one practical. The lessons included COVID-19 theory, reusable mask making, hand hygiene theory with the 9 steps for infection control, and soap making, and it was really interesting to see their end products and interact with them despite not being physically present. To make the lessons more interactive, the participants played games using Kahoot, Mentimeter, and Padlet to exchange cultural ideas.

Thanks to PP Jimmy for connecting us with Rotarian Sangay Choden from the Rotary Club of Gangtok Smart City. This project was supported by Rotarian Uttam and YSC Chair Mukund as well. Youth Services funded around \$2,562.84.

The Learning Journey Cambodia Foundation has been partnering with the Rotary Club of Singapore for many years, so it identified the target communities. The main objective of Project Kamleang is to empower beneficiaries in the field of English by giving them critical vocational skills.



A total of \$2,566.05 was allocated by the Youth Service Committee under the YEP-Go grant and our YSC Advisor PP Jimmy determined that the project should go towards the Global Grant in the next phase. The Project Director was Rtr. Chu Yuan from Rotaract Club of Singapore.

We had around 28 Rotarian advisors from Singapore and 5 Rotarian advisors from Malaysia.

PROJECT PINAY 15th Jan to 25th Feb 22

In partnership with Rotary Club of Singapore, RI Dist. 3800, and Rotary Club of Rizal West, this project was organised by the Rotaract Club of Singapore. Thanks to VP/ISD Grace and ISD Chloe for leading the committee. Thanks to Rotarian PP. Perlita and PP. Jimmy for initiating the connection, to ISC Chair Varun and ISC Committee Members who contributed around \$800.00, and to the Youth Service Committee under the YEP-Go grant which provided an additional \$2,566.05, the program consisted of a sanitary pad kit that was shipped by RACSG to Philippines.





The first round of this programme took place over 15 sessions for RID 3800 centred inaround Manilla. It targeted girls between the ages of 8 and 23, who had access to the internet, but no access to sexual education. There were no more than 65 participants in each session. Participants were distributed the sanitary pads and ebooklet.

The following round was with Rotary Club of Rizal West. Pampanga is a rural province with girls aged_4-30 who have little access to electricity and Internet, no access to sex education or clean water, and primarily are farmers. While the RACSG team handled the sanitary pad kits (sewing and stitching) and Rtn P Joan translated the content from English to Tagalog, the RCRW team conducted the session for 100 girls in this tribal village led by Pres. Cuki.



Overall, the objective is to empower the girls with sex education and teach them how to make sanitary pads this has impacted over 200 girls. In addition to learning, the participants had a great time. The participants during the last photo session sent pictures of the sanitary pads they had completed and flashed 'thank you' messages.





Our 1st woman District Governor of Rotary International District 3310 Governor that covers Melaka, Johor, Sarawak, Sabah, Singapore and Brunei Darulsalam, age 60 plus reaches the summit of Mount Kinabalu on the early morning of the 23rd April, 2022. Gunung Kinabalu, with a height 4095m (13,435ft) is the highest mountain in Malaysia and the highest in SE Asia has been graced in the RM1 note (1998) and in the current RM100 note. This shows the importance of this mountain to the Malaysian Government and its position as a UNESCO heritage site. The 8.5 trek to Low's peak is a difficult climb and has claimed the lives of several climbers. All new climbers must now be accompanied by the qualified guides. The 2015 earthquake killed a number of mountain guides who were the heroes when they went up to rescue the stranded.

DG Dolly Yeap is a well travelled person. She recently travelled to Calcutta to visit the shrine of Mother Theresa the original humantarian responsible for charity amongst the India Dispalced Orphans. The Rotary Club of Kota Melaka feels the DG's splendid effort should not go in vain and we decided to take this effort to raise funds for The Fatima Home and the Pusat Jagaan Kanak-Kanak CERIA. Both these homes were set up to care for the children from Broken Homes and they need funds during these time when they do not have the money to buy essentials.

The Trek up the mountain is full of exiquite flora & fauna and is very challenging. No one can count the number of steps leading up to Mt. Kinabalu, this will make the 272 steps up the Batu Caves staircase, look like child's play. Halfway up the mountain lies Malaysia's highest modern toilets built by some kind of souls who had the weary climbers at heart. Funds raised from this project will be partially given to the dependents of the heroic mountain guides who died during the 2015 earthquake.



Rotaract Clubs' Status on the Elevate Rotaract Policies

Year 2021-22. District Throughout the Rotary Rotaract Representative Divagaran conducted his visits to 31 Rotaract Clubs via zoom and/or physical sessions and researched on the issues and conditions that the Rotaract Clubs faced on the Elevate Rotaract Matters. There are a total of 20 Institutional Based Rotaract Clubs and 11 Community Based Rotaract Clubs.

Here are some of the findings on the Elevate Rotaract Statuses for Rotaract Clubs in Institutional Based.

As Rotaract Clubs are classified as Co-Curricular Activities (CCAs) in their respective ITEs, Colleges, Polytechnics and Universities, they face competition of recruiting members to their clubs with other CCAs other community service related CCAs. With the implementation of the Rotaract membership dues on 1st July 2022, the clubs face another obstacle that will bring down their recruitment of members every year due to other CCAs having to not imposed such



dues on their members. Though the benefits of paying the dues were highlighted during the visits, e.g., Rotary Learning Center, leadership events etc., clubs mentioned that the students can join in other CCAs that offers the following benefits for free. Due to the strict rules and regulations by the institutions, teacher advisors that were present in some of the DRR Visits mentioned that collection of the membership dues from the students is strictly not allowed. However, some Rotaract Clubs may be given approval in using their Club Budget, given by the certain institutions every year, to pay for the Board of Directors membership fees, but not the entire club members. This is subject to approval by the higher management of the Institutions. Most students in the institutions are also joining Rotaract Clubs to complete community requirements during their course of studies. Thus, clubs feel that imposing such dues on members that are only joining for the volunteering aspect is not advisable and it will create a drop in the membership strength of the club.








Findings for community based Rotaract Clubs showcased that most members are generally alright in paying the membership dues for the club. For the Registry of Societies, some of the Rotaract Clubs are tied to other associations such as Community Development Council or People's Association, thus they could not be registered under the registry of Societies. Some clubs also do not meet the minimum requirement number of members to register as a society as well. Currently, there are 3 community based Rotaract clubs that are registered under ROS which are, Rotaract Club of Johor Bahru, Rotaract Club of Raffles City and Rotaract Club of Singapore West.

Recommendations

From the findings above, it is recommended that District 331 will have to work closely with the respective sponsoring clubs ensuring the dues could be co-paid or fully paid for the Institutional-Based Rotaract Clubs Board of Directors.

In the long-term, there is a need for an action plan to come up something that can help offset the dues for these clubs. District Rotaract Representative Divagaran will continue in Rotary Year 2022-23 as Elevate Rotaract - Lead to work on a long-term solution for the institutional based Rotaract Clubs to report the full membership for the 31 Rotaract Clubs in our District.


