THINK LIKE A ROTARY PEACE FELLOW

There are many pathways to peace, and in Rotary, we are fortunate to have Rotary Peace Fellows who demonstrate this truth time and again.

Each year, Rotary awards up to 130 fellowships for leaders around the world to study peace and development, and what these peace fellows learn prepares them to work in conflict prevention and resolution and promote Positive Peace. Here are a few examples of the creative ways peace fellows advance peace:

Promoting Sustainability

Alejandra Rueda-Zarate combined her Rotary Peace Fellowship in peace and conflict resolution with her master's degree in energy and resources to support her dream of protecting the Colombian countryside.

She founded the organization NES Naturaleza in 2011 to help farmers in Colombia and across rural Latin America gain access to knowledge and training to uphold sustainable farming standards.

That support has improved the lives of nearly 4,500 farmers, inspiring many of them to become entrepreneurs. And it's helped promote both natural and social sustainability throughout Latin America. Colombian countryside.

Ending Racism

Peace fellows Geoffrey Diesel and Kathy Doherty have applied their fellowships in peace and development studies toward cofounding the Racial Equity Project, a subcommittee of Rotary Positive Peace Activators in North America committed to studying ways to create a more peaceful society through antiracism efforts.

The Racial Equity Project takes a deep look into how the eight Pillars of Positive Peace could support efforts to address racism, and it works to spread this message to communities across North America. The organization initially from Rotary's grew strategic partnership with the Institute for **Economics** and Peace, a global think tank dedicated to promoting Positive Peace.

May the continuing work of peace fellows and the Rotary members who support them inspire you to continue to Create Hope in the World through service, fundraising, and creative thinking.

Managing Disasters Using Data

Through а Rotary Peace Fellowship. Jamie LeSueur earned a master's degree in social science within peace and conflict research. He now leads emergency operations for the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, setting a management and operational framework for agency collaboration emergency response situations.

Jamie has found that research data is a powerful tool to bring calm to the complex world of disaster response. No matter what an organization's protocols might entail, letting research be the foundation for decision making helps clarify even the most complicated emergencies.

These stories — and hundreds like them — show how Rotary is creating a generation of leaders ready and able to build peace worldwide. Nearly 1,800 peace fellows have graduated from Rotary Peace Centers, and they are applying their craft in more than 140 countries.


Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH)

Clean water, sanitation and hygiene education are basic necessities for a healthy environment and a productive life.



GLOBAL GRANTS WASH PROJECTS ROTARY CLUB OF SENTOSA'S SECOND SIGNATURE PROJECT

In Rotary Club of Sentosa, we had embarked on several International Projects since 2013. Sustainability in Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) Project is a key principle that supports Rotary Foundation's areas of focus. Since 2020, our Club has determined a long term and sustainable projects centered around building toilets in both primary and secondary schools in the province of Siem Reap, Cambodia. This initiative of ours is supported by Global Grants from Rotary Foundation.

This project has brought about changes to the lives of many students in Siem Reap. They have benefited from the convenience of newly built toilets and improved hygiene at schools. To date, our Club has completed 6 Global Grants, constructed 32 toilets under WASH projects, several schools with hand washing stations. Currently, 3 more WASH Global Grants are in the pipeline for building 15 more toilets. The total toilets for schools done under WASH is 47 toilets. This project has benefitted 49 schools in Siem Reap, Cambodia.

Building toilets in schools can significantly improve the quality of sanitation for both students and teachers in several ways:

 Promoting Hygiene: Access to clean and functional toilets encourages proper hygiene practices, among students and teachers, reducing the spread of diseases and promoting overall health. - Promoting Hygiene: Access to clean and functional toilets encourages proper hygiene practices, among students and teachers, reducing the spread of diseases and promoting overall health.
- Increased Attendance: The lack of toilets can especially affect girls' attendance due to privacy concerns and menstrual hygiene needs. By providing separate and private toilets for girls will encourage them to stay in schools to be empowered. Schools can help ensure that all students feel comfortable attending regularly.
- Better Learning Environment: Improved sanitation facilities create a more conducive learning environment, where the students and teachers can focus on their studies without distractions or health concerns to poor sanitation.
- Reducing Dropout Rates: Addressing issues related to sanitation can contribute to reducing dropout rates, as students are more likely to continue their basic needs, such as access to clean toilets, are met. It will also empower girls to have equal opportunity to attend schools, making them more secured and valued.
- Teacher Retention: Better sanitation facilities also benefit teachers by providing them with a healthier and more comfortable working environment, which can contribute to teacher satisfaction and retention. These teachers are in partnership with us in educating the students about personal hygiene.

RCKK PEARL'S WASH PROJECT

Bringing Clean Water and Sanitation to communities in need in Sabah

The Rotary Club of Kota Kinabalu Pearl (RCKK Pearl) has always been passionate about community service, and its second signature project, Water and Sanitation (WASH) Project, stands as a shining example of this commitment. Initiated in 2019 by then-President Datuk Dr. Sharifah Habsah, with the support of District Governor Jeff Yong, this project has been transformative for many rural communities.

Driven by the then-President's passion and like-minded team members, the WASH project began with a visit to SK Kawiyan and surrounding villages at the end of July 2019. The initial objective was straightforward but critical: provide clean water and build toilets for the school and nearby kampungs. What started as a single initiative soon grew into a larger mission to ensure that every villager has access to clean water and proper sanitation.

After further study, the team worked towards planning on the enlargement of the existing water catchment well using a gravity-flow water system with revamped and reinforced pipelines to cater to the increased water pressure.





The success of this project has been driven by strong partnerships. Collaborating with Rotary Clubs of Likas Bay (Sabah), Bandar Seri Begawan (Brunei), and Changi (Singapore), along with Pertubuhan Komuniti ELITE, has been vital. Additionally, the project received generous sponsorships from Suria Capital Holdings Berhad, Sam Ling Group, and the Malaysian Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, which enabled it to reach even more communities.

Under the leadership of Past President Datuk Suzannah Liaw, and with key contributions from Rotarian Catherine Liew (RCKK Pearl) and Past President Wong Chu Lai (Rotary Club of Likas Bay), the WASH project expanded its scope. Initially focusing on SK Kawiyan, it now benefits other villages in Ranau, Pitas, and Kota Marudu, with plans to extend to six more villages in Pitas through a groundwater project.



One of the key success factors of this project is the involvement of the village folks to ensure communal ownership of the works done. It encouraged responsibility and created an environment where the project can thrive sustainably through self-regulated maintenance structures within the communities.


To date, the WASH project has made a tangible difference in the lives of 1,376 homes, 1,708 families, and 8,104 villagers, with a total investment of more than RM827,000. These efforts have not only improved health and sanitation but also brought hope and dignity to many.

The WASH project is about more than just infrastructure; it's about transforming lives. Access to clean water and proper sanitation is a fundamental human right that enables communities to thrive. Each new water source and sanitation facility is a step toward a healthier, more resilient future for these villagers.

Looking ahead, RCKK Pearl remains committed to expanding the WASH project. The next phase, embarking on groundwater projects in Pitas, aims to bring clean water to even more villages, continuing to improve lives and foster hope. This project will explore different methods of supplying clean water as the gravity-flow system may not work in these new areas.

The RCKK Pearl WASH Project exemplifies the power of Rotary's mission to serve others as People of Action. It highlights the impact that dedicated Rotarians and their partners can have when they work together to address critical community needs with the involvement of the community themselves. Through this project, RCKK Pearl is not just providing water and sanitation; they are providing the foundation for a better future.

Supporting Education to SMK Binyu and SMK Sampun, Sarawak

This initiative exemplifies the power of partnership between Rotary and private organisation to improve education in the local community.




