EVALUATION OF THE 21st RI D3310 PETS AND ASSEMBLY

PRESIDENTS-ELECT TRAINING SEMINAR:

- 1. Some of the participants would like more time to interact with the DGE and with the AG assigned to their club.
- 2. Some participants felt that the training leaders should facilitate more group discussions.
- 3. Some participants would like more variety of teaching methods during the training (probably more workshops).
- 4. More opportunities should be given for interaction among presidents-elect
- 5. The participants agreed that the plenary session speakers were motivational
- 6. Generally, the participants:
 - a. Agreed that they were more 'knowledgeable' with the various topics at the PETs after the training;
 - b. That the 'program presentation', 'district knowledge' and 'logistics' were 'agreeable'.

SOME OTHER COMMENTS:

- 1. Some participants felt that 'role playing' and 'educational games' should be introduced
- 2. There should be more time for discussions on the various topics
- 3. The CLP is not clearly explained

DISTRICT ASSEMBLY

- 1. Generally the participants agreed that they were more 'knowledgeable' of their duties and responsibilities after the sessions
- 2. Generally the participants 'agreed' with the program presentations.
- 3. Most of the participants felt that the Case Studies and Workshops were useful but can be improved on the presentations.
- 4. There should be more variety of teaching methods (workshops?)
- 5. Slides and PowerPoint Presentation did not 'enhance the overall learning experience'

SOME OTHER COMMENTS:

- 1. There should be longer breaks in between
- 2. The presentation slides should be made available to the participants
- 3. More information required on the DSG and DDF and how to apply
- 4. Encourage more sharing of success stories and best practices

- 5. Dim the lights for video presentation
- 6. Make sure all air conditioning units in the rooms are functioning properly
- 7. The rooms are too small for easy movements suggest 'round tables'.

MY COMMENTS:

- 1. The Organising Chair Bella Khor must be commended for arranging and coordinating the events. Well done and thank you.
- 2. The facilitators and resource persons carried out their responsibilities well, but last minute changes should be avoided as these can be quite stressful.
- 3. PP Leslie did very well with coordinating all the multi- media equipment....well done and thank you.
- 4. Timing of the sessions was generally OK, but there were instances of running late...not surprisingly these facilitators did not attend the briefing that morning.
- 5. We need to figure out how to have a '5-minute break' after each session.
- 6. Facilitators should not wait until all the participants are in; they should start even if there are only three or four participants in the room....keeping time is important.
- 7. Before winding up the session, allow 5 minutes for the resource person to 'present his view', if any.

8. In my opinion, the 'evaluation/feedback' forms do not really reflect the 'real situation'....most participants would choose the 'easy way out' by 'agreeing'; the 'usual few' would come out with harsh/non-constructive comments(as long as they can remain anonymous). I would prefer an 'open forum' where all the participants are encouraged to give their comments. The 'nasty ones' would not dare to criticize for the sake of criticizing, for fear of being ostracized by their peers...however, good constructive comments can be expected.

Rotary International Annual Themes and some success stories.



District Governor Dr Kochitty Abraham and charming spouse Geetha, Incoming District Governor Haji Zainie Abdul Aucasa and lovely spouse Hajjah Kalimah, Past District Governors and their supportive spouses, District Governor Nominee Lee Kong Hwee and lovely spouse Nana, District officers, Presidents of the various clubs in District 3310, Distinguished guests, Ladies of Rotary and my fellow Rotarians.

On 7th February 2011, with the Almighty's blessings I achieved 3 score & ten indeed I am honoured to be invited as your Guest-of- Honour for the opening of the 21st District 3310 Assembly. Having been installed the 56th District 330 Assembly as the District governor for year 1990/91 in Kuala Lumpur.

I am delighted by the members of the "Boys Brigade" who escorted me into the function room. The "Boys Brigade" formed the "Guard of Honour" during my wedding ceremony in church in the year 1966. You now know how long Doreen has been my constant companion.

Tonight, I take pleasure to address you on the annual Rotary International theme and share with you some of her successful stories. Rotary is now 106 years old and with all its experiences gained guided and led by illustrious Presidents and their R.I Boards of Directors and the Council on Legislation, Rotary International is indeed a very successful N.G.O serving the community worldwide.

Every year the R.I President will come forth with a theme to guide Rotarians in their efforts to do good for the community. "To Dignify Human Being", "Serve to Unite Mankind", "Let Service Light the Way", "Share Rotary Serve People", "Rotary Bring Hope", "Honour Rotary with Faith and Enthusiasm", "Create Awareness-Take action" and "Rotary Shares". The above Rotary International themes tug at my heart strings and inspire me to contribute whatever I can to Rotary long after my year of service as a Club President (1975-1976) and as a District governor in 1990-1991. These annual Rotary themes and many more, also serve to inspire, motivate and encourage Rotarians around the world to do what they could to make the world a better place for the less fortunate, the needy and the sick. Rotarians worldwide refresh, renew and rededicate themselves at the beginning of each rotary year commencing on the 1st of July and continue to contribute till the end of June the following year. These themes are carefully selected to encourage and motivate Rotarians to render "Service Above Self".

When I joined Rotary in March 1975, I encountered the theme "To Dignify the Human Being". This theme struck a cord in my heart and those of the caring Rotarians to do what we could for children born into slums and ghettos and later to commit to Polio Plus to try to put an end to the suffering of Polio stricken children who were condemned to crawl.

In year 1979/80, I assumed the Presidency of R.C of Johor Bahru with the theme "Let Service Light the Way". No one lights a candle and hide it under the bushes. Yes, let your "service" be seen by men as "Rotary brings Hope". Our service in bringing hope can be seen by countless examples with success stories both locally and worldwide. Rotary International's most successful story is the Polio Plus Programme. Started in year 1985 with Rotarians being the 'key' and 'catalyst' as

they "act with Consistency, Credibility and Continuity". We are grateful to "Bill Gates" for the donation of the U\$S200 million to challenge Rotarians to end Polio which has crippled children worldwide.

Recently, we witness Rotarians in our District walking all the way from Kuala Lumpur to Johor Bahru and thence to Singapore to raise funds to match Bill Gate's challenge. With the help of WHO and American Centre of Disease Control, Rotarians have succeeded to reduce polio cases by morethan 99% and now the only endemic countries are India, Pakistan, Afghanistan and Nigeria.

This Rotary year, R.I President Ray Klingsmith has stressed the importance of membership as well as the continual support for the Rotary Foundation. Incoming R.I President Kalyan Banerjee has also impressed upon us the importance of Membership. The call for membership development has been stressed by several Presidents since 1998 when membership has been hovering around 1.2 million. Several articles have been written by R.I. on membership development and retention. Countless seminars have been conducted by R.I membership coordinators but the results remain unsatisfactory. We really need to "Share Rotary -Serve People".

Rotary needs to encourage members to win more civic minded people to join the movement, even to the extent of inviting spouses of Rotarians to join and work side by side with rotarians to serve the community. Good examples of husband & wife teams in Rotary are in PRIP Louis Vincente Giay & Spouse Celia, Rtn Dr Lim & Spouse PP Bella Khor from Johor Straits View, PP Val Winslow & Spouse Rtn Yvonne from Singapore R.C Serangoon Gardens Orchard and PP Nelson Loong and Spouse PP Fancy Tan from R.C of Johor Centennial.

There are several ways Rotary can make membership reachable to all sectors of the community. Recently, the Board of Directors have come out with pilot programmes with the following proposals such as the Satellite Clubs, Corporate Membership, Associate Membership and Innovation and Flexibility. These are useful programmes to take note of in the Membership Development programmes.

Rotarians need to "Honour Rotary with Faith & Enthusiasm". Serving Rotary with love and sincerity is to honour Rotary. In 1996, a young philanthropist by the name of Dato Yap Sing Hock, owner of Lien Hoe Corporation, invited me to have a look at 2 pieces of land in Kulai for the setting up of a Haemodialysis Centre. As a result of the visit, not only did he donate a piece of the land to the R.C of Kulai, but he also donated a substantial sum of money for the construction of this centre. I was rather curious as to why he made the donation, Sensing the need to give me an answer he replied, "I have noted you and Dato Francis Ng serving as Rotarians and I believe in Rotarians because of the good example that you both have shown, I know my money is in safe hands. Rotarians have earned the trust and credibility of the public. I urge all Rotarians to continue to be good trustees of public funds.

The Polio Plus Programme that began in the Philippines in 1985 has done well throughout the world. The recent spread of dengue fever has affected people in S.E Asia and in particular Malaysia. It was timely that the "Reducing Child Mortality Conference" was held in Johor Bahru, last year when a number of distinguished speakers from overseas participated. Amongst the speakers was PDG Dr Ben Henson from Manila who delivered a paper on "Dengue Eradication" and today with his guidance, we are able to assist the government in the Jawatankuasa Tindakan Denggi Johor Bahru. President Dr S Sivamoorthy of the R.C of Johor Bahru and myself a former Public Health Engineer in year 1970 in the Malaria Eradication Programme, Ministry of Health Malaysia have been appointed by the Johor Bahru government to sit in the committee for "Dengue Eradication".

If the above programme is found successful, Malaysia can use this programme, to reduce, control and eradicate the spread of dengue.

In this assembly, we enter to learn and depart to serve. How much we learn will show how well our clubs is administered. Receiving the rotary Presidential Citation from Rotary International is the reward of every serving Club President of the District and I wish you and your board of Directors well.

Teaching is learning. I congratulate all Training Leaders for their dedication and commitment. With every Assembly you serve, the wiser and more knowledgeable you will become.

At this juncture, I would like to congratulate District Governor Dr Kochitty Abraham and spouse Geetha for dedicating a whole Rotary year "Building Community and Bridging Continents" May respect, esteem and friendship be your reward for your significant contributions.

My best wishes go to District Governor-Elect Haji Zainie Abdul Aucasa and spouse Kalimah. May you have good health and safety as you lead our District for a year of dedicated service as you "Reach within to embrace Humanity" may service opportunities fill your path may enlightenment and fulfilment light your way throughout the coming Rotary year.

In conclusion, I urge you, my fellow Rotarians to be annually recharged and motivated by the annual Rotary International themes and be continually encouraged to "Share Rotary Serve People" at club, District and International level year after year.
