At the 2023 Rotary International Convention in Melbourne, I asked all Rotary members to become champions in our effort to illuminate mental health needs near and far. This includes helping one another feel more supported, advocating for mental health services, and building bridges with experts in the field to expand access to treatment.

It's an important task and a big ask. But it's also something that should feel familiar to every Rotary member — because everything we do is in the spirit of caring, giving, friendship, and compassion, and has been from the beginning of our organization.

We've grown into an amazing global network of 1.4 million interconnected community leaders — leaders who share a deep commitment to doing good in the world. But what makes Rotary powerful isn't just what we do for the communities we serve. We also support and empower each other, by creating a safe space for our members to bring their whole, authentic selves. We show each other comfort and care.

These connections are deeply meaningful. The U.S. surgeon general recently declared loneliness a public health epidemic. Dr. Vivek Murthy said, "We must prioritize building social connection the

same way we have prioritized other critical public health issues such as tobacco, obesity, and substance use disorders." I am proud of what Rotary has done across generations to build kinds those social connections this and magazine focused on loneliness and what Rotary can do about it in its January 2023 issue of the Rotary Magazine.

Our worldwide community and foundational value prioritizing Service Above Self makes Rotary a powerful global advocate for mental health. A recently published study by Ohio University performing acts of kindness was the only one of three mental health interventions tested that helped people feel more connected to others. Study co-

author David Cregg said, "Performing acts of kindness seems to be one of the best ways to promote those connections."

This research suggests what we've known all along — that doing good helps transform not just the communities we serve, but it also transforms us. As we put a greater focus on mental health, let's not think of this effort as something new to Rotary, but rather as something we can do better and as a result have a greater impact on ourselves and the people we serve.

We are not starting this effort from scratch. The Rotary Action Group on Mental Health Initiatives has been focused on these kinds of issues for several years, and we will be looking to members of that group for leadership as we continue to build awareness.

Mental health care fits comfortably within several of our areas of focus. As of May, there are 41 global grant-supported projects with a mental health focus. Many of them have tremendous promise, and we will be highlighting them in the months ahead.

So let's work together to erase the stigma associated with emotional well-being, raise awareness of mental health needs, and improve access to preventive and interventional mental health services. Together, we will *Create Hope in the World*.

## Bringing Health To All

# Rotary Club of Bintulu Central (RCBC) and LDS Charities Collaborate to Enhance Rural Healthcare Services in Bintulu, Sarawak, Malaysia

The world has witnessed an unprecedented disruption to social wellbeing since the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic in December 2019. Malaysia, including Sarawak, has experienced significant impacts on society's wellbeing. In response to these challenges, RCBC has partnered with LDS Charities since April 2020 to launch a series of projects under the theme of "HOPE." Recognizing the need to complement government efforts, our focus has been on donating medical and health equipment to rural health service facilities, with the aim of improving the overall health and wellbeing of our community in Sarawak.

Below listed 3 series of Hope Delivery:

# DELIVERY HOPE ~ HANG IN THERE #KitaMestiMenang

Carried out in July 2021 for Medical Frontliners covering 4 Major Cities in Sarawak. Total donation and delivery of KN95 and protective clothing PPE Jumpsuit amounted approximately RM 420,000.00 for PKB Kuching, PKB Sibu and Hospital, PKB Bintulu and Hospital and PKB Miri.

### DELIVERY HOPE ~ TOUCHING MORE LIVES #KamekSatuKeluarga

Carried out in Nov 2022 for rural hospital and clinics of East Malaysia. Total donation and delivery of medical equipment amounted approximately RM 1.8million for 224 rural health facilities

# 3 DELIVERY HOPE ~ "BRINGING HEALTH FOR ALL" #KamekUntukSarawak

48 additional pieces of equipment donated to the Bintulu District, which will establish mini labs for 12 rural clinics. This crucial initiative ensures that all health clinics, regardless of their location, will be equipped to provide basic health screening services.

Bintulu, the 9th Division in Sarawak, covers an area of 12,166.21 km², making it the 4th largest section in the state. With an estimated population of 266,200 people in Bintulu, approximately 56% reside in rural areas. Presently, there is only 1 hospital, 12 health clinics, 1 community clinic, and 1 maternal & child clinic in the district. Among, only two clinics are equipped with x-ray facilities and four clinics have laboratories. Bintulu and Tatau Health Clinics serve as referral centers

The objectives of equipping rural health clinics with basic laboratory equipment are as follows:

- 1) Enable early diagnosis through basic laboratory tests at rural clinics for health screening purposes.
- 2) Enhance accurate diagnosis by providing laboratory tests at rural clinics, enabling doctors and specialists at referral centres to better guide rural clinic medical staff in delivering pre-hospital care.
- 3) Improve chronic disease care and enable efficient follow-up at rural clinics with better monitoring capabilities.
- 4) Enhance patient satisfaction by reducing the cost and time required for patients to travel to main health clinics for healthcare services.

The urgent need to upgrade rural health clinic services with basic laboratory equipment has become imperative. Assessing the present needs in conducting health screenings, it is crucial to increase the identification of chronic diseases and facilitate appropriate treatment cross reference to the achievement of PeKA B40 screening in Sarawak, as reported by ProtectHealth Corporation in April 2022, stands at only 10% of the total eligible population of 583,253, indicating a low screening rate.

The low achievement of health screenings can be attributed to inadequate access to laboratory equipment. Availability of basic laboratory equipment is essential in healthcare institutions for effective screening and diagnosis of underlying diseases.






Without regular health tests, patients may go untreated for extended periods, which further burdens families and the country as a whole.

RCBC's collaboration with LDS Charities aims to bridge these gaps in rural healthcare services. Bintulu is now the only city provides Point of Care Testing in all 14 clinics. However, we recognize that we cannot achieve this alone. We express our sincere gratitude to the dedicated healthcare teams of PKB Bintulu for their commitment and assistance in making this initiative possible. Further to the support of our State Health Department and Ministry together, we could strive to improve health screening capabilities and enhance the quality of care for all members of the Bintulu community.

Perhaps the pandemic hasn't brought entirely negative outcomes; it has taught us to be proactive, prepared, and preventive. LDS Charities and RCBC see this collaborative PILOT project as a significant milestone, it will serve as an experimental model and hopefully provide guidelines for more NGO involvement in other divisions.

In the words of Mother Teresa, "None of us, including me, ever do great things. But we can all do small things, with great love, and together we can do something wonderful." aligned today as our project title: "Bringing Health for All" #KamekUntukSarawak

# District Membership Report

Dear Rotarians of D3310.

Greetings to all of you as we step into the month of August, which we celebrate as Membership Month in Rotary. It's essential that we come together to address the pressing matter of declining membership that has impacted our global Rotary community. The decline from 1.19 million to 1.15 million members since 2019 is concerning, and it's crucial that we take proactive steps to reverse this trend.

As we reflect on this situation, it's evident that there are both challenges and opportunities that lie before us. While there has been growth in membership across Asia, we must not overlook the need to focus on our strengths and weaknesses as we work towards growing Rotary as a whole. Our collective effort is required to emphasize the significance of expanding our clubs through the inclusion of new members.

While our primary mission is centered around doing good and serving our communities, it's important to recognize that the impact of our services has created an avenue for attracting individuals who share our values and aspirations. The first step is to invite them to join Rotary, thereby allowing us to broaden our reach and influence.

Turning our attention to the current state of membership in D3310, we see a modest increase of 16 members, translating to a **growth of 0.7%** from 1st July to 31st July 2023. While any growth is a positive sign, we must acknowledge that we have a target of 10% growth for the year ahead. This signifies the importance of collective efforts from each club. The goal of adding a net total of 2 members per club is achievable through dedication and commitment.

It's worth noting that consistent efforts yield consistent results. Our past performance indicates that the rate at which clubs attract and lose members tends to remain steady from year to year unless deliberate changes are made. This underscores the importance of embracing a culture of consistency as we work towards our membership growth objectives.

Imagine the possibilities if we were armed with the knowledge of how many members we might lose this year and how many we need to attract in order to achieve growth. With this insight, we could strategically plan and allocate our resources to not only retain our existing members but also to actively seek out new individuals who share our passion for service.

In unity, we can create hope for Rotary on a local and global scale. Let us focus on our immediate surroundings and make a positive impact before extending our efforts to the wider world. May this message find you all in good spirits, and I send my best wishes to each Rotarian. Together, let's work towards a future where Rotary thrives, and the spirit of service and fellowship continues to shine brightly.

District 3310 Membership Development Team 2023/24



Sickness is gray, but the world is colorful. The Rotary Club of Johor Straits View organized aspecial event today to brighten the lives of cancerstricken children who frequently visit hospitals. The event featured a performance of the "Drum up JB" 24 Festive Drums, aiming to provide these children, who are often confined to cold hospital rooms and unable to play with friends of the same age, with an opportunity to step out of their monotonous routines and into a new world.

A group of 20 children undergoing long-term treatment at the Sultan Ismail Hospital (Hospital Sultan Ismail) cancer center in Johor Bahru were part of this initiative. These children, of various ethnic backgrounds including Chinese, Malay, and Indian, range in age from 5 to 18. Some are leukemia patients. others suffer from lymphoma, and some are dealing with kidney failure, all at such a young age.

"Sunshine Children" program 25 years ago, aiming to bring smiles to sick children. Dr. Razak, the project's leader, who is also a surgeon at the Princess Specialist Hospital, highlighted the club's ongoing support for the cancer centre. This includes purchasing special formula milk every month for families with limited financial means.

Dr. Razak acknowledged childhood cancer is quite rare and a heavy burden for both the children and their parents. He explained that these children undergo lengthy treatments. sometimes involving tubes. injections, saline drips. and chemotherapy, surgeries. Unable to have a normal diet and play with friends or siblings, the emotional toll on these children and their families is considerable.

that this caring activity for the children occurs once or twice a year. In the past, they took children to the popular beach resort of Desaru for



outings, and they also organized gatherings for the children during Christmas or New Year's. "These activities help the sick children forget about their pain. This time, when the children found out we were taking them to a performance, they were very excited."



Due to the COVID-19 pandemic over the past 3 years, the "Sunshine Children" activities hadto be temporarily suspended. Duringthat time, the Rotary Club of Johor Straits View shifted from physicalevents to providing gift baskets. Now, they have resumed activities, once again taking the children out of the hospital to experience the outside world.

The "Drum up JB" performance was attended by the 20 sick children, their guardians, and 5 nurses who were specially arranged by the hospital to provide assistance as needed. we found the sponsorship from Siangmalam Travel & Express Sdn Bhd for the bus transportation.



We wanted to expose the children to different experiences, enriching their lives with more colorful gray moments. The "Drumming Johor Bahru" 24 Festive Drums performance is a unique spectacle to Johor Bahru, making this outing possible.

The children participating in this event were selected by the hospital. They are mostly capable of moving around, with some still attending school while others cannot. Hope that through such activities, the children's lives can become more vibrant, allowing them to experience things they normally wouldn't and thereby making their lives different.

During the performance, the children were completely engrossed, attentively watching the stage without any signs of drowsiness. Some were even eager to join in and try drumming on stage.



Emphasis on the slogan of the Rotary Club of Johor Straits View for this event "Give a reason to children to smile." Seeing the smiles on the children's faces now, she is happy to have achieved the goal of "bringing happiness to children." Our Club spent approximately RM 6,000 for this meaningful event, and they hope to continue such initiatives, with the next planned destination being the Singapore Zoo. They are actively raising funds to make this future event possible.



6th July 2023 - Past President Hong Kay Wee, Regional Chair for Disaster Response from the Rotary Club of Segamat, Johor, along with President Andy Tee, spearheaded a group of Rotarians and Interactors in conducting a comprehensive survey of households in one of the affected areas of Taman, Segamat. The purpose of this survey was to assess the damage caused by the recent flood and determine which household items had been destroyed.

The Rotarians and Interactors took the initiative to engage with the residents of the affected area, interviewing them to gather information about the extent of the losses they had incurred due to the flood. This undertaking forms part of the ongoing efforts of the Rotarians and Interactors in post-disaster recovery and rebuilding. By providing support and assistance, their aim is to instill hope and improve the living conditions of the affected residents in the aftermath of the flood.

#### STEP UP TO END POLIO FLAG OFF

20 August 2023 - The Rotary Club of Bandar Seri Begawan ignited the Step Up To End Polio campaign with a spirited jungle walk at Dadap Recreation Park, Bandar Seri Begawan. This 3.5km trek drew 40 fervent participants and marked the planting of two "Flames of the Forest" trees, symbolizing hope for a polio-free world.

In another impactful initiative, the District End Polio Now Region Johor-Melaka, in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Kulai, orchestrated two vital events: the Environmental Awareness program and the Step Up To End Polio Flag Off Day. Distinguished guests, including Yang Berhormat Wong Bor Yang and PDG Dolly Yeap, officiated a flag-off ceremony. Additionally, 40 walkers embarked on a symbolic journey to climb Gunung Pulai Mountain in Kulai.

Across Sarawak, Rotarians made their mark. In Kuching, members gathered at Taman Sahabat for a 2km walk, donning the iconic red End Polio attire. Simultaneously, in Bintulu, another group of Rotarians, along with visitors from neighboring clubs, embarked on a 2.5km walk along the picturesque beach.

Sabah joined the movement, commencing the 8-week Step Up Challenge at Perdana Park, Kota Kinabalu. Led by Past President Emily Chong and supported by Assistant Governors Edward Tan, Lewis Fong, and Steven Lau, 50 enthusiastic Rotarians participated. Warm-up aerobics and a leisurely park walk set the tone, joined by prominent attendees such as PDG Philip Chong and PDG Datuk Lee Chuen Wan, followed by a delightful light breakfast.

In Singapore, the 8-week EPN Step Up Challenge officially started at Kallang Wave. Organized by EPN District Chair PP Jimmy Cheong and Regional Chair AG Linda Chiang, Rotarians and their families from various clubs united. District Governor Dr. John Chan and First Lady Wee Ping flagged off the challenge, marking an hour-long walk with a resounding declaration to END POLIO NOW.

These events underscore Rotary's unwavering commitment to eradicating polio. Together, we're scripting a powerful chapter in the fight against polio, showcasing the remarkable impact of collective determination and action.




