

Mental Health & Your Club

2023-24 RI PRESIDENT R. GORDON R. MCINALLY

Dear fellow Rotary members, The World Health Organization designates 10 October as World Mental Health Day, and with Rotary placing a special focus on mental health this year, I would like to help answer the question posed to me most often when I travel to meet members: How can my club get started?

There are some wonderful examples of Rotary members taking action already. In the Philippines, the Rotary Club of Tiaong-Hiyas held a 12-week health challenge for mothers in the community to promote some baseline health screenings and coaching on a healthier lifestyle.

By the end of the challenge, the mothers had a special bond and decided to form a Rotary Community Corps called llaw ng Tahanan ("one who lights up the home") with the goal of involving more mothers in health education and wellness support — and later youth services, teen pregnancy prevention, and help with unhealthy substance use. Almost a year later, the RCC is preparing to open its own health center where mothers can come for peer-to-peer support.

Another strong example is in Colorado. In the fall of 2021, a small group of stakeholders from the Rotary Club of Highlands Ranch formed the Rotary Clubs of Colorado Endowed Fellowship for Pediatric Mental Health, which enhances the ability of Children's Hospital Colorado to recruit and train pediatric psychiatry providers and allows the hospital network to make additional appointments. This increases access to mental health care for children and decreases provider shortages.

Since then, the project has brought on new supporters and is now fully funded with a \$500,000 endowment. Investment income from this endowment will support a fellow — a psychologist

or psychiatrist — at Children's Hospital.

A new fellow will be named every one to two years, beginning spring of 2024. Over time this will create a cohort to bolster the mental health workforce, treating kids from all 64 Colorado counties and neighboring states.

There are many more great mental health project stories on Rotary Showcase, and I invite you to share your experiences as you begin your own projects. Also, please reach out to **mindhealth@rotary.org** with any thoughts or ideas you would like to share about mental health in the Rotary world.

On 10 October, I will host a Facebook Live event when we will recognize World Mental Health Day and further explore how Rotary members can begin this journey. But I would like to leave you with one way every Rotary member can make a difference.

Right now, there is someone you know in the Rotary world — in your club, from a project you've worked on, in a Rotary Fellowship or Rotary Action Group — who could use a little more of your time and attention. Rotary is this great gift of global friendship, and that also means being there for each other.

Discovering the human connections that bind us is what we do through our membership every day. It's what Rotary has always been about, and we can build on it by helping each other find peace at home.

We need to learn how to ask not just "How are you?" but also "How are you really?" By doing so, Rotary can continue to Create Hope in the World.

It was an exemplary achievement by the Rotary Club of Miri Oil Town (RCMOT) when it jointly organised with the Advocates Association of Sarawak (AAS) and the Sarawak Courts Working Group on Environment (SWGE) on an Outreach Programme to Batu Bungan in Mulu on 6th October 2023.

RCMOT carried out the Medical Mission 3.0 with participating medical professionals from the private sector and the Miri General Hospital led by its Director Dr. Jack Wong. RCMOT set-up booths for Paediatrician, Dentistry, ENT, Opthalmology, Optical Correction and General Medical care to provide assistance to 130 adults and 140 children from the surrounding Mulu villages.

The other joint organisers conducted special classroom programmes for the school children relating to sexual awareness and environment care.

The Malaysian Judiciary also participated in this medical mission and led by the Chief Justice Yang Amat Arif (YAA) Tun Tengku Maimun.

District Governor Dr. John Chan who was presence distributed the school bags and daily provisions to the rural participants, truly exemplifying the Rotary ideal of "Service Above Self"

In the evening, the entourage attended RC Bandar Penggaram Mandarin Installation.
















DAY FOUR

The Spirit of PE

Christy Fe Salazar

As October is also Breast Cancer Awareness Month, the newsletter editorial team hopped on a Zoom call with fellow Rotarian, Christy Fe Salazar, to listen to her story and journey.

Vivacious and full of life, one would not have guessed the battles she has fought within herself. Christy Fe Salazar, is a spirit of hope be it as a Rotarian working with her club, RC Tawau, serving the community, or in her role as Chairperson of the Tawau Kinabalu Pink Ribbon raising breast cancer awareness and working hard to improve the facilities available for patients locally.

In 2008, she had been feeling some numbness in her right hand which affected her daily activities and even after doctor's visits and a mammogram, her condition was still a mystery. Following the discovery of a peanut-sized lump during a self-examination and flying to Kota Kinabalu for a biopsy procedure and potential <u>lumpectomy</u>, she was formally diagnosed with breast cancer in December and was recommended to undergo a <u>mastectomy</u> followed by 6 cycles of <u>chemo</u> and <u>radiotherapy</u> sessions.

The side effects of chemo caused severe emotional depression for Christy and had to be prescribed heavy medication. After her chemo treatments, she was put on hormone therapy. Tamoxifen is known to increase the risk of getting ovarian cancer and in September 2009, she was diagnosed with severe ovarian cancer which resulted in a total abdominal hysterectomy and another round of radiotherapy.


In 2012, 4.5 years after her first diagnosis, she began to feel uneasy on her right rib and had to



be put on heavy painkillers. Since Sabah did not have the facilities to conduct a <u>PET scan</u>, she flew to Kuala Lumpur to have it done and they found a mass on her 5th rib. After a soliciting a second opinion, she started her chemo every 3 weeks for 6 cycles.

The follow up PET scan revealed that the mass has spread to the 6th and 7th ribs which resulted in 6 more cycles of chemo and 10 targeted radiotherapy sessions that cleared the mass. Her prescription of Tamoxifen was switched to Femara and after 3 months of pain, was put on Aromasin for 10 years.

Cancer survivors are required to do scans annually but due to the pandemic and lockdowns, Christy was unable to do her routine scans from 2020 to 2022.





In September 2023, she noticed that she was grasping for breath doing activities she loves like dancing, walking, and hiking. She was also beginning to develop a fever which prompted her to visit her doctor.

The following day she experienced a high fever and was quickly admitted. Her blood test results showed elevated readings. The CT scan had also detected a lot of white spots on her lungs which were identified as lung mass.

After 11 years of being cancer-free, her breast cancer had spread to her lungs (<u>lung metastases</u>) and Christy remains unstoppable. She continues to raise awareness about breast cancer and help other patients and survivors to find their voice and be a pillar of support in the community.

The most difficult thing was to see my mum cry. At that moment, I decided that I was done with depression and I shouldn't make my mum cry.

So the next appointment with my psychiatrist, I gave back all my medicine to my doctor because I didn't need it anymore. I had found the right medicine that can cure my heart and my mind.



During her remission, <u>Kinabalu Pink Ribbon</u> (<u>KPR</u>) approached her in 2013 to lead the cause in Tawau which she did and still actively does today.

She reached out to <u>RC Tawau</u> through PP Rahada, to work together for their first fundraising run as <u>Tawau KPR</u> was still at its infancy. The collaboration introduced Christy to the Rotary family which she later joined in late 2016. She has served 3 consecutive years as Community Service in the club where she has not only led various community projects but continue to reach more people to spread awareness on a cause that is near and dear to her heart.

Measuring impact enhances reporting of an organization's contribution to the community including the strengthening of relationships with stakeholders, and it helps measure the impact of the organization's projects on people and the environment.

District and Global Grant projects are required to be supplemented with a report that monitors and evaluates the impact of the project. Reports should include:

- An assessment of the progress toward your main objectives, or changes to those objectives
- A list of the project activities that are underway or have been completed
- A summary of the data collection methods
- The latest data you've gathered
- The total number of people who will benefit from the project
- An accounting of project expenditures that require reimbursement

Different grants will also have different points of measurements to include in the report such as more comprehensive financial information (project income, bank statements, project expenditure) and list of key participants in the project.






